Most Pedal Harps Harps with 40-47 Strings

You can use nylon or gut to string your pedal harp. Generally though, pedal harps are regulated for gut strings in the 3rd - 5th octaves. Gut strings are grabbed by the discs differently than nylon strings, which are smoother. Most people use gut on the 3rd through 5th octaves for the best tone. Many people in hot and humid climates use nylon on the 3rd octave. For the most part, gut is used on the 4th and 5th octave for best tone, and some people prefer gut all the way up.

Above First Octave (the 2 shortest strings at the top - not all pedal harps go this high)

G 00 Octave Pedal Nylon or Pedal Gut (also known as double ought G)

(hint: 47-string concert grands go to this low note, the 7th Octave C. The exception is that there are some Venus semi-grands with 46 strings that go to the low C, and the note they lack is the 00G way at the top.)
